I pulled my back pack blower from the bend, and placed it on the trailer to crank. A noise from behind startled me. It was coming from behind. It was 6:30 am and it was still pitch black. The sunrises had been coming later than normal. I know. You're wondering, what kind of lawn work I was doing in the dark? It was an office building, and I was getting ready to blow off the parking lot. This was a marginally lit parking lot.

Just then I could hear a couple of guys talking as they walked up behind me. I drew back and almost jumped out of my skin. No, I wasn't attacked or beaten. These young guys weren't out to assault anybody. They were just on their way to high school around the corner. Was I shaken? Scared? Startled? All of the above! At first as they came closer, I knew what was going on and I wasn't anxious anymore.

A few minutes later, I was blowing off the still darkened parking lot, with headset radio playing, focused on something else all together. I turned, looked up and saw a tall man shrouded in the shadows staring at me as he stood next to the property fence. Once this creepy looking dude noticed that I had seen him, he snuck back around the corner. It was then that I remembered the plant nursery next door. They hired mentally challenged people to care for and water their plants. I had put things into perspective, so my panic dissipated.

Now that my mother (who I'm sure is reading this newsletter) is half scared out of her mind, I have to tell you that I don't normally work in the dark. However, from time to time, in spite of our best precautions we all come face to face with unexpected dangers.

King David faced a number of dangers. He killed lions to protect his sheep. As a boy David chose to whirl a stone at a Giant and became the national hero. He fought invading armies and conquered nations. Throughout his life we see David being hunted even by his own son. Yet in several Psalms, David declared that when he was afraid he would not fear but trust in God.

So often the unseen scares us. Is it any wonder that in the Gospel of John that we first see Jesus coming to us as the light of the world? I love those verses John 1:4,5 (<u>NIV</u>). "In him was life, and that life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it." Jesus came to give us new life and flood our darkness with His pure and perfecting light! Is that encouraging or what?

By the time, I had finished blowing off the empty parking lot the Sun had risen. It brought into full view everything that moments before had been hidden in shadows. That's what light does. It illumines.

So often we become fearful because of a lack of understanding. Psalm 119:105 reminds us that God's Word lights our direction. Each day we all make several choices of what we will do and where we will go. The Bible can help clarify and give us perspective on those decisions. Throughout Psalm 119, we find David meditating on God's word, precepts, and promises all day long, and even on his bed at night.

Like the two guys creeping up behind me, it is often the things we don't see that frighten us most. Sometimes we don't see these scary things, because they are out of our field of vision (by accident or on purpose.) Often we refuse to confront memories from our past denying their impact upon our present and future. Memories can represent unsettled places in our brain, that need further processing. There are so many things scientists are still learning about how we order and store perceptions, feelings, and accounts of the past. Time and again we can become stubborn and refuse to look back, fearing it might become too painful or be irrelevant to the present. Think about it. Even if I had never turned to see the two creepy guys walking up behind me; at some point they would still have come around in front of me, just as they did. It's the same with painful or fear based memories.

We can bury them so deep that they are out of sight but sooner or later they resurface.

I don't recommend that we dwell in the past too long, but I do think having the courage to face the past helps propel us forward to the challenges which lay ahead. I've found such security and comfort in taking my past hurts and memories to Jesus for healing. In Him we find illumination. In John 12:35,36 (NIV) we find Jesus warning them, "Walk while you have the light, before darkness overtakes you. The man who walks in the dark does not know where he is going. Put your trust in the light while you have it, so that you may become sons of light."

Back in my parents' church, we use to sing the old hymn by, Thomas Chisholm "Great is Thy Faithfulness." There is a phrase in the first stanza that reads, "There is no shadow of turning with thee." Light doesn't cast shadows. In James 1:17, we are reminded of this great promise: "Whatever is good and perfect comes down to us from God our Father, who created all the lights in the heavens. He never changes or casts a shifting shadow." (<u>NLT</u>) There is safety and security in Christ. Embrace His light!

Jim never thought of himself as depressed until his Missions **Director called him in** for a meeting. He and Dana had been on the mission field for a year now, and their results had been less than promising. Jim assumed since he had taken Spanish in college and his wife taught English as a second language part time at the local high school, things would have gone better.

At first a core group of leaders surrounded Jim and Dana and tried to teach them nuances of their culture. Little by little these people began to pull away, as the couple failed to make quick transitions. Dana



began to withdraw. She had nothing in common with the women in her village. Soon the children were frustrated with being made fun of and rejected. In time the missionary couple were given a new location, but could find few things to appreciate. Jim missed his wife's laugher and the way his wife use to dish out compliments. He could sense a huge wall of resentment between them. The unity they

once enjoyed had eroded into hysteria and confusion. He tried again and again to express his frustration to a small group of tribal leaders. They could not identify. Jim knew these men saw him as weak and unable to solve problems even in his own home.

In less than a year, Jim and Dana returned home hoping things could return to normal. A close friend or a good counselor could have given them the support and accountability they needed. Instead, their sense of personal failure increased as they had to confront their financial contributors. When they were unable to immediately find jobs, insignificance set in,

because of the sluggish economy. Their dream of becoming missionaries deteriorated into a nightmare in course of one short year.

Jim and Dana needed true supporters who not only gave finically, but emotionally and relationally too. Today email and Skype allow friends back home to provide encouraging prayers and spiritual support. Locally, Dana and Jim needed others in the body of Christ who could be "God with Skin on."

As you meet and learn of missionaries going to a foreign field, know that they are not only representatives for God but for us as well. They need your earnest and specific prayers. **Remember the** adjustments they face with extreme culture shock, interpersonal issues, marital friction, anger and depression. Don't forget their children's similar needs. **Pray purposefully!**
